What a busy week it has been, especially for our Key Stage Two children. They have continued to enjoy their swimming sessions with a number of non-swimmers now swimming with a good degree of confidence – a real achievement! Our more competent swimmers have been exposed to an hour of intensive coaching each day and are really being challenged to improve their technique and stamina. Louise and Carole, the swimming instructors, have both commented on how well behaved the children have been – a real credit to the federation, themselves and you!

The Key Stage Two children also represented the federation at the Remembrance Service at Woody Bay Train Station on Tuesday 11th November. The service was led by Rev'd Jean and provided the children with a poignant opportunity to remember those who have given their lives for the freedom we enjoy today. As has now become tradition, the locomotive AXE provided a focal point for the service, creating a very real link with those who served on the front line and following the service the children all enjoyed a ride on the train. I'd like to thank everyone at the Lynton and Barnstaple Railway for their hospitality on the day; it is very much appreciated.



Across the three schools we have recently purchased new 'Huff and Puff' equipment. 'Huff and Puff' is an active playtime programme that we have been running for a number of years, although over the last couple of years the play equipment has become a little tired. We have used some of our Sports Premium funding to rejuvenate our resources and the children certainly seem to enjoy using the new kit.

I am also absolutely delighted to announce that Lynton has been successful in securing a Primary Spaces grant from Sport England. This will enable us to completely transform our back playground area into a multi-use sports area for use by children from across the federation. Class news - Streams

Our literacy work has been all about instructions based on the book "How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth". The children have been learning about how to set out instructions, how to use 'bossy' verbs and to think about putting instructions into the correct sequence. The children will then be writing their own set of fiction instructions.

This week in our maths, we have been exploring 2Dshapes – we have been learning about symmetry, and thinking about which shapes have symmetry and which don't. The Year 2 children have also been exploring how to use a square to find right angles in different shapes. We are also learning about position and direction – giving each other instructions as to where you need to go on an obstacle course, for instance, – making a direct link with our literacy learning.

Our theme learning continues to be of great interest to the children. We learnt about what our muscles do and how they support our movements. This week, we have experimented with our hearts- tried to count our pulse before exercise and then again after exercise. The children had fun doing this. We have also been learning about Remembrance and thinking about the significance of poppies – especially at this time of the year.

Thank you for continuing to support our policy on not bringing toys into school other than a Monday when it is show and tell day.


Class news – Rivers

In literacy we have been writing instructions on how to mummify a body; a particularly gory and messy task! The children are now expert Egyptian embalmers. Next week, the children will be independently applying the skills that we have been developing in shared writing to write their own instructions. In maths we have been using place value to support addition and subtraction. I have been encouraging all of the children to use base ten equipment; units, tens, hundreds and thousands cubes and sticks, these help the children to see the calculations differently. It has been shown that using this equipment not only supports children who find maths tricky but also extends and deepens the understanding of those children who are very able in this subject. In our theme learning we have been reading the myth of Osiris and Isis, the first recorded mummification. I challenged the children to work with a group to present the story to Streams class. The children came up with a range of presentations; drama, picture book, PowerPoint and puppet show. Streams enjoyed watching and gave the children some valuable feedback.

We went to Ilfracombe Academy this week to take part in an afternoon of problem solving and team working activities. The children were in groups with children from other local schools and really enjoyed working together to complete each task.

Stargazing journals

I have heard from Francis Harrison who led our Dark Starry Skies Workshops last year. She is preparing an exhibition based on her work with local schools for Lynmouth Pavilion in December. If you still have your stargazing journal could you please bring it in to school next week so that she can collect them and incorporate them into the presentation. It doesn't matter if you haven't finished the whole book, just bring along what you have.



Class news - Oceans



Our first week of swimming lessons kicked off with great success! We have all made lots of progress; many of us facing our fear of water. Louise, our instructor, said that we were incredibly well behaved and as a group we all supported each other, listened and applied new techniques. She seemed very impressed with us as a Federation.

We are joining the rest of the country at this time of remembrance, by taking a brief look at 1st world war poets and their choice of language, use of personification, simile and metaphor. On Friday we explored the school records at the time of the war and visited the wonderful display commemorating local community members who served in the forces during this time. We also explored local monuments that stand as tribute to them. Over the next few days we will use this subject as a vehicle for us to develop our own use of descriptive techniques.

As a class Oceans are continuing to measure the world in time and space. We are graphing time and temperature but also looking at efficient methods of finding the difference between amounts. Practical sessions are grounded in real life scenarios, as pupils chart temperature and climate changes, speeds, distances, heights and weights over time.

How can you help at home?

Literacy:

Ask children for comparisons between things, focussing on the accuracy and inference of their choices e.g. If you see a big dog, ask them how big it is and ask for an object or another animal that they could compare it to when describing it to someone.

Reading:

When listening to your children read, ask them why the author has chosen specific descriptions, what

images these descriptions put in the reader's mind and what these descriptions tell you about the character.

Maths:

When possible ask children what the time is and how long it will be until dinner, until you reach your destination, until you are going out or how long a journey / activity will take.

Primary Spaces - Press Release Guidance 2014

LYNTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL GIVEN FUNDING BOOST TO IMPROVE OUTDOOR SPORTS FACILITIES

Lynton CE Primary School is set for a major boost after it was successful in gaining \pounds 22,500 to develop new outdoor sports facilities at its site.

The funding is part of Sport England's £18m National Lottery funded Primary School Facilities Fund which is helping more schools to provide outdoor multi-activity play areas across the country.

The investment is designed to support those schools which are in greatest need of facility improvements and will benefits both pupils at the school and the local community who will have access outside school hours.

At Lynton CE Primary School the new investment will go towards creating a 6m x 7m games space on our rear playground. The games space will have safety surfacing and floor markings, a free standing end enclosure, hoop and back panel, mini goal and graphics panel. Additional activity surfacing will also be provided to match and supplement the main activity area. On our front playground, an activity track will also be created. Jayne Peacock, Executive Headteacher, said, "This is an incredible boost for Lynton School and the wider federation. It will completely transform our playground environment and provide a bright space within which children can enjoy active playtimes and teachers can deliver high-quality PE lessons. This would not have been possible without funding from Primary and for which we are extremely grateful".

Nick Bitel, Sport England Chair, said: "Having the right space to play sport and be physically active as a child is vitally important. We are delighted to be investing this funding in Lynton CE Primary School to improve the spaces that will give children the space to start enjoying PE and sport.

Sebastian Coe, CH KBE, the Prime Minister's Olympic and Paralympic Legacy Ambassador, added: "A positive first experience of PE and sport at primary school is crucial to encouraging young people to be active throughout their lives, but for those schools with little or no outside space this can be extremely challenging to deliver.

"This funding will provide better outdoor multi-activity play areas at Lynton CE Primary School that can be used both within the curriculum and outside school hours by local communities. I am convinced this will boost the opportunities for young people to be physically active.

This fund builds on and complements the Government's \pounds 150 million a year Primary PE and Sport Premium.
