Within Collective Worship our thoughts and prayers are currently with the people of Nepal as they come to terms with the devastating consequences of last week's earthquake.

Class news - Streams

We have finished writing our stories based on the book "Previously". The children have learnt a lot about using descriptive language and using extended sentences. We are now going to start work on the book "Fatou fetch the water". Within this learning sequence the children will have opportunity to extend their learning about using different sorts of punctuation including speech marks.

Our maths learning has been based on extending our knowledge about addition and subtraction — the children have learnt how to use a number line efficiently and are able to choose which method to use to solve given problems. We are going to move on to be learning about 3Dshapes and their properties.

The children have been enjoying their theme learning – we have learnt about the oceans and continents of the world and then we have learnt about the United Kingdom and the various rivers that there are. The children have used atlases to help them. We had a talk from the RNLI about beach safety, and the children designed beach safety posters. We are going to move on to looking at boats and the history of boats – how they have changed and what helps boats to float.

The Reception children are enjoying their learning based on The Rainbow Fish – the children have learnt about shells and have been investigating various sea creatures. The children are enjoying playing in the role play area where they can play in their imaginative underwater land.

We have welcomed to school the new intake for September and they will be visiting us on most Mondays between now and 6th July. We hope that Billie, Emily, Theo, Milly, William, Oliver and Esmie will have a wonderful time learning in school. Streams are very excited when they come in for their visits – they love to be able to 'help' with the new children.

<u>Class news - Rivers</u>

It has been a busy couple of weeks in Rivers class. We have been learning more about the role of the lungs in our bodies and have been measuring our lung capacities. There is a description of this experiment on our blog. We have been investigating erosion in our learning about river formation. We have been creating our own erosion investigation using water, soil, gravel and stones to see what effect running water has on

different size particles.

In literacy we are continuing to explore explanation texts. We are now reading Think of an Eel, a beautifully illustrated book explaining the life cycle of an eel. The text is written in two "voices" – a factual voice and a poetic voice – both describing the same events in different ways. In maths last week we were developing our investigative skills – working systematically, recording results and testing ideas. This week we are looking at shape and position – using co-ordinates to describe the position and movement of shapes. Jim Doherty

<u>Class news - Oceans</u>

SATs are next week. Monday will be our spelling and punctuation tests, Tuesday is reading, Wednesday and Thursday are Maths (mental maths, Paper1 and paper2). We will be taking the papers in the wooden classroom in Parracombe after a lovely breakfast and, weather permitting, having lunch in the vegetable garden behind the wooden building whilst we prepare for our Level 6 papers in the afternoon.

Parracombe Revels is at 13:00 on the 20th May (next Wednesday), many thanks to Parracombe community who have worked with us to arrange and put on the event. Can I remind pupils that they need to be in school promptly as we have a jam packed week before half-term. This high level of activity continues after half-term with the year 6s having their forest school from Monday 1st June to Wednesday the 3rd. They are sleeping over at Kentisbury on the evening of the 2nd and will need sleeping bags. Thursday the 4th and Friday the 5th are their Guardianship sessions with the National Trust which are being held in and around the Heddon Valley this year. In essence these sessions are focussed on our natural environment and during the sessions we have asked that the children practise traditional skills that work with the land e.g. stone walling, making walking sticks and baking bread amongst other skills. They then have a "Beach Smart" day at Puttsborough where they will learn about beach safety. Jo Kift and Rupert Tilly (Ilfracombe Academy's transition team) will be in Parracombe during the afternoon of the 9th of June to answer any questions the year 6 may have and then both years 5 and 6 will be exploring the river at Allerford on the 10th.

Whilst the years 6 are out on excursions we will be focussing on the year 5s. Maths will look at practical real-life applications and Literacy will be based around our book of the moment "Wind in the Willows" by Kenneth Graham. I am hoping to use the artwork of Mick Cawston to inspire our own wind in the willow style stories based in and around the local area.

How you can help at home:

Literacy – We need to practice converting verbs from present to past and future tenses.

Reading - When reading with children, ask them their opinions or what they think the character's opinions of an event are. Challenge them to explain or give proof to back-up their opinions through the text. Proving inferred meaning is a key skill that is tested.

Maths - We need to practice converting distances, weights, time and capacities. Please take opportunities to ask children how many m in a Km, how many g in a Kg, etc.

<u>Class news - Young Buds</u>

I was incredibly proud of all the Young Buds last week; they worked so hard in all areas of their learning and in particular produced some fantastic stories to finish off our 'Fatou fetch the water' sequence. For the next couple of weeks we will be focussing on traditional tales, and in particular 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff'. Mrs. Watts and I have a very exciting trip planned which will link with both this and our 'water' theme (details to be confirmed shortly). We hope this will inspire children in their writing and really bring to life some of the work on Rivers which we have been doing in Science and Geography. In our Maths learning we will be looking at 'time' next week, this is always a really tricky concept for the children to grasp so any work you can do with them at home on this would be greatly appreciated. For example time how many jumps they can do in 10 seconds, 1 minute, 5 minutes etc so they begin to understand how long a minute actually is or when going out look at the clock and discuss what time you are planning to leave/arrive and where the big hand and little hand will be at this time etc. Little conversations like this, regularly, can make all the difference to the children. Thank you for your continued support, we are all looking forward to a productive and fun filled couple of weeks in the run up to half term.

Class news - Oaks

Over the last few weeks, Parracombe has gained a new adventure trail in the playground, it certainly looks very impressive and the children love using it. The garden is also coming on very well; the children have all contributed to planting and tidying the area up, the school grounds are continually improving.

In literacy, years 3 and 4 have started a new unit of explanation texts, currently focusing on the core text, 'How do dogs really work?' Children will build on their knowledge throughout the unit to write their own text explaining how rivers work or how the body works.

Currently in maths children are exploring the most efficient methods to use to solve a problem, focusing on explaining their reasoning. Next week, we will move on to investigating 3D shapes, learning the properties and making nets of shapes.

Our topic, 'Go with the flow' has made a positive start and all children are engaged and are questioning different aspects of rivers. Children have already secured a bank of key language and are using it throughout their explanations and written work. Over the next few weeks, children will be investigating the Lynmouth floods through looking at photographs and reading recounts from the disastrous event.

Last week, a selection of children from across KS2 were chosen to represent the federation at a swimming gala held at Ilfracombe pool. The children showed a range of skills and talent along with brilliant sportsmanship, congratulating each other and those from other schools. I was very proud of all the children participating in individual and team events.

Finally, next week will see year 6 sit their KS2 SATS, they have been working extremely hard and over the last few weeks their focus and attitude to learning has been noticed, we wish them all the best. Miss Hill

Last week the children enjoyed making lambs with Kelly, looking at the lambs in the field next to us, considering what they look like and counting their eyes and legs. We have looked at our beautiful fruit trees blossoming and the children have enjoyed talking about the colours, what they need to grow then making their own popcorn blossom trees (and eating some too!).
