

Dear Parents/Carers

It seems hard to believe that the end of another school year is rapidly approaching. This is always an extremely busy half term and this year is no exception, with very few days following the 'normal' routine. Despite this, I have been very impressed by how focused the children have remained upon their learning and how the usual 'wind-down' towards the end the academic year has, so far, been avoided. Keep it up children – your excellent attitude towards learning has not gone unnoticed!!

I'd like to thank all of you who took the time to respond to our recent questionnaire. We have carefully looked at your comments and, where possible, acted upon your suggestions. For example, as of the next academic year clubs will run every week of the year with the exception of the week prior to Christmas and the final week of the academic year. Letters regarding clubs for the Autumn Term will be sent home shortly, including afterschool child care provision at Little Berries until 6pm, which will be available to children from across the federation.

Next Wednesday the Cats Protection League will be visiting each school to talk to the children about owning and caring for pets. They will also be collecting donated items suitable for the cats currently within their care, such cat toys, tinned or dried cat food and blankets, etc, suitable for cat bedding. If you would like to send in any items, all donations would be very gratefully received.

Finally, you may have seen or heard about an article on the North Devon Journal website last week which cited the best and worst primary schools within North Devon. The information reported was taken from a new, invalidated website and was exceptionally misleading. It used a star system to rank schools based upon their KS2 SATs results which did not take into account schools without any KS2 children in 2014 (as was the case at Kentisbury) or schools with less than five KS2 children whose results are not nationally reported (as was the case at Parracombe). As a result, both Parracombe and Kentisbury were rated within the bottom five schools. We were extremely upset by this as it negated the achievements of our children last year when 100% of our pupils at Parracombe achieved Level 4 or above in Reading, Writing and Maths with 50% achieving at Level 5. This is considerably higher than the national average of 79% achieving Level 4 and 25% achieving Level 5 and is also higher than many of the schools within our locality who were ranked about us within the quoted report. The article has since been removed from the NDJ website and an apology published. However, I understand that the article did prompt some discussion on social media, some of which was not particularly positive. With this in mind, please find attached some parental guidance on the use of social media.

#### Class news - Streams

I hope that you all had a lovely half term and that you have enjoyed the sunshine that we have enjoyed this week.

The children had a lovely time at Lynmouth investigating and finding out about freshwater creatures and sea creatures when we went on our seaside safari last week. The year 1s had a great sleepover on Tuesday and a good day at Forest School on Wednesday – even though they were all a bit bleary-eyed.

We have already completed a sequence of learning in literacy based on non-fiction recount writing, and have begun a new book this week. Our literacy learning in Year 1 and Year 2 is going to be based on the book. The disgusting sandwich, by Gareth Shaw. The children have already enjoyed the story and will be writing a story based on the book.

In maths this week the children have been learning about place value and using their number bonds to solve problems. Next week we will look at multiplication and division and see how we can use our skills to solve problems.

In our theme learning we are still writing our reports of sea creatures and then we are going to look at the history of the seaside and to think about how holidays at the seaside are the same and how they are different now.

The Reception children are going to develop their learning based on The lighthouse Keepers Lunch. The children will be involved in creating a role play area based on the story and will have chance to use and investigate pulleys. The children will have chance to design and make their own sandwiches.

I would be grateful if you could ensure your children bring a hat to school when it is sunny to protect them. Thank you

#### <u>Class news - Rivers</u>

I have really enjoyed listening to the children's stories of their trip to London before half term. It sounds like they had a wonderful time. We have a photo of the children on the London Eye which is available for you to view and buy online. Go to www.picsolve.com/londoneye. At the moment, in literacy, we are reading The Wind in the Willows. This text will be the stimulus for much of our writing this half term. So far, we have looked at how Kenneth Grahame creates atmospheres in different settings, eg. Fear in the Wild Wood. The children are really enjoying listening to and reading about the adventures of Ratty, Mole, Badger and Toad, this also links with our play for the summer production which we have already started to rehearse. In maths we are developing our understanding of multiplication and division – recognising and using the inverse operation to solve and check calculations. In science we have started to investigate electrical circuits. We will be building and testing circuits. Later in the term we will be applying this knowledge to design and make a flood alert system.

As you know, our environmental walk with Ione Wilcock, ENP warden, had to be postponed last week due to the weather. This has now been rearranged for Wed. 15<sup>th</sup> July. I will send out another letter closer to the date.

Can I remind you that children should be bringing their own water bottle into school each day. We have facilities for children to refill their bottles during the day but cannot provide cups. PE is on Tuesday and Wednesday each week. PE kits should be kept in school all week so that they are available if this arrangement needs to change. Our next visit to the library is on Friday 26<sup>th</sup> June.

#### Class news - Oceans

It's been a busy return after half-term. The year 5s have been completing their optional SATs whilst the year 6s have been learning how to build dry stone walls, make fire, cook on fire and how to be "beach smart". All of these trips have been focussed on giving the children relevant and purposeful life-skills and I think this programme of events in the last half-term of yr6 primary school has been really successful. We have organised our play parts and have started play practise and prop production, "Wind in the

Willows" is now in full flow and promises to be brilliant. In literacy we are continuing with the Wind in the Willows theme and writing our own similar animal based stories. This sequence is concentrating on our use of descriptive techniques. In maths we are extending our use of multiplication and division, exploring methods and practical applications.

#### How you can help at home:

Literacy – Our use of tense is improving but we need to continue to focus on it and handwriting. If you require handwriting sheets please ask me to send some, my preference at this age is to create a poetry anthology in which the children copy out poetry and decorate the page. Your child has been sent home with these exercise books for this.

Reading - When reading with children, ask them their opinions or what they think the character's opinions of an event are. Challenge them to explain or give proof to back-up their opinions through the text. Proving inferred meaning is a key skill that is tested.

Maths - We need to practice our number bonds to 10, 20 and extending this to 100 along with a big push on times tables.

This linked very well with our theme learning on 'water' and the children have spent the last week writing a recount of their trip in Literacy, these will soon be displayed in the school.

In maths we have been having a 'revision' week going back over things which we need a bit more practise on - top of the list was 'time' as well as simple multiplication and division. The children have also been completing 'quick fire time's table' tests everyday to try and get those number facts really secure - why not test them at home on their 2, 5, and 10 times tables?

The Year 2's have also started doing their SATs papers this week and I've been so impressed by their attitude and

application throughout.

Year 1's won't miss out on all the fun though as they have their 'phonics screen' test next week! It's nothing scary, just a chance to prove how good they are at the things we do every day.

Finally we welcomed next year's Reception children into school for the first time yesterday. Young Buds looked after them

wonderfully, I was very proud of them as starting school can be a scary time but they made the transition much easier for our newest additions. We look forward to welcoming the new intake into schools every Thursday between now and the end of term.

#### <u>Class news - Oaks</u>

Oak's Class have been so busy recently, they are experiencing many days out, trips and learning life experience whilst out of the classroom. Before half term year 3 and 4 had an amazing time in London; we went to see Charlie and the Chocolate factory at the theatre, went on the London Eye, and visited the Natural History and Science museums. We had a fun packed two days! The children's behaviour was exceptional and they were a joy to take!

In literacy, last week we focused on writing a recount, where some of the children wrote about their London experience. We are now moving onto 'Wind in the Willows' in literacy which fits in with our school production at the end of the term. Children will learn how to write their own play script, write detailed descriptions and finally write their own narrative chapter.

Last week in maths we were learning about coordinates and how to represent data in the form of bar and line charts. Next week, we will return to learning about multiplication and division.
