Moving the event to the morning certainly seemed to work well with the pressure of finishing in time for school transport removed and the summer sun having not reached its full intensity. Class news – Streams

We have been busy writing our stories based on The Disgusting Sandwich. The children have been working very hard with this literacy sequence and are producing some good work. They have been thinking about extending their sentences and working on improving their punctuation – especially the use of commas.

Our maths learning has been focussing on using and applying multiplication and division. The children have been learning about the links between multiplying and dividing, and some of the children are thinking about remainders in division. The children have been given opportunities to do lots of problem solving in order to improve their understanding.

This week and next week the Year 1 and 2s are busy improving their swimming skills. They have all been trying very hard and thoroughly enjoying the opportunity to go swimming. The Reception children have been going to Forest School and have had lovely time learning in a natural environment.

We are starting to practise for our school play now, and do hope that you will be able to come and see it on July 14th in the Town Hall.

Class news – Rivers

Thank you for supporting your children with their learning at home – it is really having a positive impact. There is a display of home learning in the corridor outside Rivers classroom and many visitors to the school have commented on it. The children are so full of enthusiasm for their learning at the moment and this is being reflected in the quality of the work coming in from home.

We are continuing to study Wind in the Willows in literacy. This week we have been exploring conjunctions in complex sentences. The children are starting to plan their own animal stories which they will be presenting to Streams class in a puppet show. In maths we are investigating the properties of 2d shapes. Our vocabulary for this unit includes parallel, symmetry, right angle, acute angle and obtuse angle. Ask your child what these words mean, they should be able to tell you and give you an example of a shape which has these properties.

In science we have been making electrical circuits and exploring switches. Thank you to those parents who have bought an energy ball. This simple object is a fun way for children to explore making, breaking and bridging circuits. We have been using one in class to test electrical conductors. Today the children have been making burglar alarms which consist of a pressure switch to complete the circuit when someone stands on it. In our final design challenge, we will be applying our circuit knowledge to make a flood warning system.

Next Monday is our Ultimate Dodge ball competition. Please remember to bring in any sponsorship money next week.

This week in Literacy we have been focussing on our choice of words and the rhythms and dynamics we can create with them. As writers we are developing our abilities to control the pace of our paragraphs, quick chases and relaxed descriptive passages. In Maths we are working towards making our own wooden box, applying our knowledge of angles, area, measuring, volume and capacity as we do this. Thank you to Ali Richardson for helping us to develop this idea.

The play rehearsals are coming along and I must say there are some wonderful solos emerging this year!



How you can help at home:

Literacy – Our use of tense is improving but we need to continue to focus on it and handwriting. If you require handwriting sheets please ask me to send some, my preference at this age is to create a poetry anthology in which the children copy out poetry and decorate the page. Your child has been sent home with these exercise books for this.

Reading – When reading with children, ask them their opinions or what they think the character’s opinions of an event are. Challenge them to explain or give proof to back-up their opinions through the text.

Proving inferred meaning is a key skill that is tested.

Maths – We need to practice our number bonds to 10, 20 and extending this to 100 along with a big push on times tables.

Preparing for the summer production has aided the children’s learning in literacy as they are able to relate their learning to their own performance.
