# SIAMS Inspection

Parracombe has just been notified that it will undergo a Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Church Schools (SIAMS) inspection on Thursday of next week (10<sup>th</sup> March). As the children of Parracombe are taught at both Kentisbury and Parracombe the inspection will cover both sites. The day will include observing collective worship, the teaching of Religious Education, talking with children, meeting with parents and governors and generally getting a feel for how being a Church School impacts upon our children's learning. Much anecdotal evidence is collected during the inspection, some of which may be quoted in the report that we receive. If your child is registered to Kentisbury and you would prefer for their views not to be reported, please let me know before Thursday of next week.

# Morning Arrivals

Could I please ask that children do not arrive at school before 8.30am as supervision is not available until this time. If you need to drop your child off before then we are able to offer a breakfast club from 8.00am at Kentisbury and Lynton, although prior booking is needed. Thank you for your assistance in helping us to keep your children safe.

#### Attendance

Our attendance rates up until half-term have continued to improve across the federation with Parracombe leading the way with 97.57%, closely followed by Lynton with 96.84% and then Kentisbury with 96.36%. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for being so supportive with regards to promoting good attendance. Attendance is much improved upon this time last year with far more children currently achieving a 100% attendance record. So much research now supports the importance of good attendance and, as the chart below starkly shows, attendance of less than 95% can significantly impact upon academic progress, not just now but into the secondary years too.

# Attendance above 97%: Less than 6 days absence a year

#### Excellent attendance!

These children will have the best chance of getting the highest grades they can, leading to more choices and better prospects for the future.

#### 95% attendance: 10 days absence a year

These children are likely to achieve good grades in most subjects. Nationally, 73% of children who have **over** 95% attendance achieve five or more GCSEs at grades A\*- C

# 90% attendance: 19 days absence a year

Children in this group are missing a month of school a year; it will be difficult for them to achieve their best. The Government identifies children with less than 90% attendance as "Persistent Absentees".

#### 85% attendance: 29 days absence a year

It will be almost impossible for children with this amount of absence to keep up with their learning at school. This will affect a child's chances of achieving good GCSE exam results limiting their choices and future prospects.

#### Class news - Rivers

Last week, Rivers enjoyed the opportunity to hear about the experiences Mr Stokes (our Chair of Governors) had when he recently visited Finland in the Arctic region. As part of their geography based learning, they have now written and explanatory text about different aspects of life in this very cold climate and how that affects the lives of people who live there. We are hoping that other visitors will be able to come in and share their experiences of other places around the world. If anyone is able to spare an hour we would be very grateful!! It is such an interesting and informative way of the children learning about other places.

We have begun looking at time and reading both analogue and 24 hour digital clocks. Any practice at home will support their understanding. We will move on in the next few days to solving mathematical problems involving time and looking at time differences around the world.

Our current genre in writing is narrative, as the children write their own chapter about travel to an imaginary world. We are focusing on dialogue and refining speech punctuation as well as other grammatical skills.

Our science is all about plant life found here and in other climates and the life cycle of flowering plants. We have some lovely artwork about to be displayed, so please come and see it once it is all up and running! Mrs Roper and Mrs Hamer

# <u>Class news - Oceans</u>

Our Autobiographies are now completed, so this week we are starting to look at Around the world in 80 days by Jules Verne in depth. This is a wonderfully exciting and well written, descriptive story, by which we will be exploring the creation of atmosphere and descriptive inference. By the end of the sequence we will create our own chapter of the book. We will also be looking at the use of the passive tense as a grammatical focus.

Fractions are the key focus of this half-term in our maths sessions. Previously we have been reading, writing and drawing them. This time we are moving onto comparing and ordering a variety of fractions and next week we will be using them with all four functions. To apply our skills to real-life contexts, we will explore fractions when cooking, gardening and measuring. This will be handy, as Oceans have now cleared the school garden, and are ready for planning, preparing and planting our new scheme.

If anyone has cuttings or seedlings that they can donate to the school garden they would be greatly appreciated. We are specifically looking for herbs, vegetables and bee friendly plants.

How you can help at home:

Literacy – continue to ask children for extra description of events or items by using what we call "Writer questions", e.g. who, when, where, what, how, why. These open questions allow us to practice and extend our descriptive language.

Reading – When reading with children, ask them their opinions or what they think the character's opinions of an event are. Challenge them to explain or give proof to back-up their opinions through the text. Proving inferred meaning is a key skill that is tested.

Maths – When opportunities arise for example distances involved when travelling or amounts when cooking, ask children to work out fractions of amounts ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ,  $\frac{3}{4}$ , 1/5, 2/10, 1/3, 1/8, 1/6, 1/9). It is also useful for them to estimate fractional amounts so that they practice and develop their ability to visualise amounts. Sincerely,
