Sihlangu has worked well. He takes responsibility for his work and has become more active in participating in class activities. Sihlangu works well with his teachers and peers in class. His reading skills have improved but there is still room for improvement in his word building skills. He struggles in formal tests but his work during the term is consistent. Sihlangu has obtained very low grades in all his subjects in the formals tests and the teachers encourage him to be more diligent this new school year. There is hope that he will do better as his confidence grows. With a little more effort in his work and behaviour in class, the teachers hope to see Sihlangu develop in his overall performance in school.

### WATER BOTTLE CHALLENGE

In the last week or two your child should have brought home a water bottle as part of the Water Bottle Challenge. Swaziland has

declared a national disaster as a severe drought enters its second year. The challenge for our children is to take a free bottle of water (kindly donated by Tesco), drink it and then fill the empty bottle with loose change. This challenge is being organised by Challenge Ministries Swaziland and every £5 raised will provide ten days of bottle drinking water for one person, four 5ltr containers to harvest rain water and relief to a nation in crisis. If your family would like to take part in this challenge, bottles should be returned to school by Friday 1<sup>st</sup> July.

### CHURCH SCHOOLS SERVICE - ST MARY'S, BIDEFORD

Earlier this week I took Izzy, Lily and Polina to St Mary's, Bideford, to represent the federation at the North Devon Church Schools Annual Service. find out facts and information over the next couple of weeks that will support their work in class.

### Class news - Oceans

We won!! Our year 6 went to play rounders at Ilfracombe Academy against Coombe Martin, Woolacombe and Ilfracombe primary schools and we won. As a result, we are competing in June against primary schools from Barnstaple as we will be representing the schools from our learning community. Having been close to winning in many of our out of school competitions for the last two years, this is a great achievement that we are very proud of and we are hoping that this is the start of a real boost for our sporting activities. We are starting (weather permitting) to run a kilometre per day as we have worked out that 10 laps of our playground equals 1K; this is not a race, just a way for us to break-up the school day with activity.

It's a busy end to the half-term. Friday saw our trip to the Devon County Show and this week we are exploring our surroundings with visits to Woolacombe and Watersmeet. We are surveying the environments and discovering how the animals and plant-life around us has adapted to thrive. All of these trips and those to come are focussed on giving the children relevant and purposeful life-skills and I am sure that the programme of events in the last part of yr5/6 primary school will be as successful as it has been in previous years.

We have also been organising our play parts and have started play practise and prop production; "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory" is now in full flow and promises to be brilliant. In literacy we are continuing with the play's theme and writing our own additional chapter to the story. This sequence is concentrating on our use of descriptive techniques. In maths we are extending our use of multiplication and division, exploring methods and practical applications, as we focus on developing our garden and planning for it to become an area that is used more by all.

### How you can help at home:

Literacy – Our use of tense is improving but we need to continue to focus on it and handwriting. If you require handwriting sheets please ask me to send some, my preference at this age is to create a poetry anthology in which the children copy out poetry and decorate the page. Your child has been sent home with these exercise books for this.

Reading - When reading with children, ask them their opinions or what they think the character's opinions of an event are. Challenge them to explain or give proof to back-up their opinions through the text. Proving inferred meaning is a key skill that is tested.

Maths – We need to practice our number bonds to 10, 20 and extending this to 100 along with a big push on times tables.
