SLEEPLESS BRITAIN

Is your child getting enough sleep? Did you see Panorama earlier this week? It is reported that a rapidly growing number of children are exhausted and that this is impacting on their health and education. Research shows that lack of sleep can affect our children's concentration and behaviour and reduce their academic performance by up to two school years. Increasingly as parents we are struggling to get our children to sleep and substantial evidence now links the use of TV, phones or tablets prior to bedtime to many children finding it difficult to switch off. Research shows that night time sleep is just as important as healthy eating and exercise for children to develop. Those who don't get enough sleep are more likely to be overweight because they tend to crave and eat sugary or starchy food during the day to give them energy to stay awake. Primary aged children should have between 10 and 12 hours of sleep per night and if our children are well rested and have had sufficient sleep, they should get up fairly easily in the morning, be alert and happy for most of the day. If you are concerned that your child is not getting enough sleep, or if you struggle to get your child to sleep, you can find advice and further information at www.nhs.uk/Livewell/Childrenssleep. Our theme this term for Collective Worship is Love which is reflected in our federation ethos, CARIS. Class News - Rivers

After we have finished our topic on adverts, we will be looking at narrative in literacy and the children will be writing their own story. You can help your child in English by making sure you listen to them read and ask them relevant questions regarding their understanding. I will be continuing to focus on encouraging the children to read every night.

In maths, we are continuing our topic on measurement. We have been working on area and perimeter presently. One of the most useful ways to help your child is to encourage them to learn their times tables. We will then be moving onto money and understanding how to tell the time.

We have started our science topic on forces this week and will be continuing this over the next few weeks. The children have been conducting their own science investigations and developing their scientific thinking.

Class News - Oceans

Our biographies are now completed, so this week we are looking at reports (from newspapers to police reports). By the end of the sequence we will have created a variety of reports and become the federation police force to solve a mysterious case. We will also be looking at the use of the passive tense and commas for our grammatical focus.

Fractions will shortly be our key focus in our maths sessions. We will be reading, writing and drawing them and then we will move onto comparing and ordering them before using all four functions with them. To apply our skills to real-life contexts, we will explore fractions when cooking, gardening and measuring. This will be handy, as Oceans will be clearing the school garden, ready for planning, preparing and planting our new scheme.

How you can help at home:

Literacy – continue to ask children for extra description of events or items by using what we call "Writer questions", e.g. who, when, where, what, how, why. These open questions allow us to practice and extend our descriptive language.

Reading – When reading with children, ask them their opinions or what they think the character's opinions of an event are. Challenge them to explain or give proof to back-up their opinions through the text. Proving inferred meaning is a key skill that is tested.

Maths – When opportunities arise for example distances involved when travelling or amounts when cooking, ask children to work out fractions of amounts ($\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{3}{4}$, $\frac{1}{5}$, $\frac{2}{10}$, $\frac{1}{3}$, $\frac{1}{6}$, $\frac{1}{9}$). It is also useful for them to estimate fractional amounts so that they practice and develop their ability to visualise amounts.

Class News - Young Buds

Young Buds had a fantastic World Book Day this year, and I think you'll all agree that their costumes were amazing! We enjoyed sharing our favourite stories, talking about different characters and even some role play. It was a great effort by everyone, well done.



Now that spring is on the way, Young Buds have been busy planting various things at school such as potatoes and beans. We will be watching them grow very closely and will also be keeping diaries of our plants. We will also set up an experiment with some of the seeds to see what affect different conditions have on growing plants. In maths we are concentrating on number again and you can help the children with this at home by counting in 2's, 5's and 10's and could challenge your child by changing the starting points, for example 2, 22, 32, 42, 52 etc or by counting backwards!

In Literacy we will be finishing our work on instructions by learning about writing in the past/present/future tense as well as looking at suffixes. We will then move on to a History based topic that will be learning all about the life of Walt Disney, linking in with our fairy tales theme.

Young Buds will be raising money for Red Nose Day this year by decorating and selling biscuits for 50p each. These will be available to buy from 3pm on Friday 24th March so please support them by either popping into school to buy one or sending your child in with some money.

Finally, a huge thank you to all of the parents who came in to see us for parent's evening on Monday. It is always such a pleasure to share with you what your children have been achieving in school. 
