END OF THE DAY

PARRACOMBE BREAKFAST CLUB

Do you drop your children off at Parracombe? Would you like the opportunity to earn a few extra pounds each morning? We are looking for someone to run our breakfast club from 8am each morning. If you have children attending Parracombe or Kentisbury, they would be welcome to attend the breakfast club free of charge. Duties will include preparing cereal, toast and drinks for the children who attend and supervising these children for the duration of the club. PRAYER BOXES

Please remember that there are prayer boxes in each school. These are used by the children, but we would welcome contributions from parents/carers and members of our children's extended family. If you would like to contribute a prayer, the boxes can be found in the hall at Lynton and Parracombe and in the Key Stage One classroom at Kentisbury.

HARVET FESTIVALS

I do hope that you will be able to join us for one of our Harvest Festivals at the end of this half-term. This year we will be collecting items for the Freedom Centre in Barnstaple. The Freedom Centre is an Open Access Day Centre for homeless and vulnerable adults, offering a wide range of services including hot meals 5 days a week, clothing, showers and advice. The Centre has specifically requested the following items:

Chopped tinned tomatoes, baked beans, tinned meat and fish, tinned soup;

Dried herbs and spices, tinned pulses, rice and cous cous;

Sugar, custard, rice pudding, tinned fruit (not grapefruit);

Coffee, cocoa, instant chocolate drink, fruit squash (not tea);

Baking ingredients - dried fruit, baking powder, vanilla essence, chocolate;

Brown sauce, tomato sauce, mayonnaise, pepper;

Non-bio washing powder, washing up liquid, kitchen rolls;

Toilet rolls, shower gel, shampoo, kitchen roll, hand wash (not bar soap).

UPDATE ON SHILANGU

As you are no doubt aware, we sponsor a child in Swaziland called Shilngu. Sihlangu has lived at Hawane Children's Home since 1 January 2006 when he was just 4 years old. His parents passed away. He has three brothers and two half-sisters. Sihlangu's name means 'protection or shield'. Sihlangu lives in a 'family-style' home with other children and is looked after by house parents. He attends Bulembu Christian Academy which offers an international-calibre education. He also has access to numerous clubs and after-school activities. Bulembu Ministries and Challenge Ministries work directly with Swaziland Social Welfare to welcome children into their care program. Their vision is to raise up the next generation of Swazi leaders to provide a bright future full of hope for orphaned and vulnerable children who will then be available to serve their nation. Our theme this term for Collective Worship has been 'Our Planet and its People: Thinking Globally'. Throughout the term we have thought about issues around the world relating to water, food, refugees and natural disasters. We have considered the need for peace and prayed for world leaders in the hopes that the world may one day live as one.

Class News - Streams

The children have settled into school life and the term seems to be well and truly underway. The children and myself have been loving our topic of World War 2. The children have been so enthusiastic to find our more and follow their own interest into the many different aspects of the topics.

Home Learning

Thank you for all the home learning that the children have brought in so far. Just a few notices regarding the tasks

Home learning is shared with the class on a Tuesday afternoon as part of our 'Show and Tell'. Although I would love the children to complete them all, it is not obligatory to complete all the home learning tasks. They are designed to encourage children to continue their learning at home in a fun and engaging way. At West Exmoor Federation we endeavour to help children develop their own independent learning skills.

For the children just starting school these tasks can be followed as much or as little as needed. At this stage of the year we would love to see any home learning that the children decide to do. This could be something totally unrelated to the topic.

At the end of the Autumn term, in December, Lynton School will hold a celebratory home learning assembly where we will show off all the home learning that the children have been doing. The children will receive a

certificate for their efforts and one pupil from each year group will receive a special prize for excelling in their home learning and displaying outstanding independent learning skills.

Home reading

The foundation stage children have been working hard in their phonics lessons and learnt the initial phonetic sounds. The children will now be bringing home reading books which will allow them the practice these sounds. Please try to read every night to consolidate all their hard work at school. The children will be starting to bring home red banded books. Please feel free to change your child's book when you bring them to school in the morning. These books can be found outside the two Stream's classrooms. It is great to get involved with choosing books and follow up any interests with their home reading. We would recommend that you read each book a couple of times to develop fluency also. Please feel free to speak to Mr Mackenzie, Mrs Berry or Mrs Bowden-Berry if you have any queries.

Pre teaching

Exploring a topic for just 10 - 15 minutes prior to their main learning has been proven to aid children's ability to retain information and develop their understanding. For example, this 'pre-teaching' could be a quick activity use your children's toys to help explain addition. These news letters are sent out every two weeks to give parents an idea of what we will be learning about in the coming weeks. This year, I will be focusing on one subject each newsletter. This way, I can offer a detailed explanation of the learning that is going to take place.

Maths

The foundation stage children will be learning to count up to 10 and represent numbers in different ways. This will include matching the numeral to a set of objects such as numicon.



In year 1, the children will be developing their understanding of numbers from 0-20. Building representations, ordering, comparing and counting backwards. The children will then move onto understanding pattern in number. We will explore counting up in sequences of 1, 2 and 10's and

how the numbers sequences change. Further on, we will explore the number system up to 100 and look at how to form patterns in the numerals. The children will also be learning to write numbers as words. Year 2 will count in steps of 2s, and 5s from 0. They will talk about the number patterns and begin to count in steps of 3s from 0. Later in the week we will count forwards and backwards in 10s from any given number. We will explore odd numbers and even numbers. Finally, we will use numicon to make mathematical patterns and begin to learn the 2x tables.

Thank you Naomi, who has been coming in on Fridays and using her fantastic forest school skills to teach the children about Autumn, tying knots and first aid. Thank you to Eve Parkinson, Kelly Peacock and Pat Taylor who have been coming into school to read with the children. Your help is invaluable, thank you! If any other parents would like to come in to school to hear children read, we would be extremely grateful.
