

Dear Parents/Carers

It has been another couple busy weeks across the federation and, despite the murmurings of Christmas beginning to take hold, the children have continued to be incredibly focused upon their learning. I am extremely proud of all our children and the energy and determination that they put into tackling new and tricky areas of learning. Throughout the federation we have been working for some time now on building our children's perseverance and resilience, and encouraging them to really push themselves. We are constantly reinforcing that being stuck is good, as this is when we do our best learning and I really do sense that the determination of my staff to pursue this is finally bearing fruit. Whenever I walk into a classroom the children can't wait to tell me how hard their brains are having to work and to share with me examples of how they have overcome learning challenges. Well done children (and staff) – you really are wonderful!

VOLUNTARY ONE-WAY SYSTEM AT PARRACOMBE



We are continuing to experience difficulties with the movement of traffic in and out of Parracombe at the start and the end of the school day. This is causing frustration for parents/carers, staff and local residents alike. Last week, Jan Stokes and myself met with members of the Parracombe Parish Council and Parracombe and Parracombe Community Land Trust. We have agreed to trial a voluntary one-way system between the hours of 8.15am – 9.00am and 3.00pm – 3.45pm. During these times we kindly ask that drivers access the school via Bodley Cross and leave the school via Church Lane. The PPC are speaking with local residents to request that passing places are left clear during these times to assist with traffic flow, and to also request that they too implement the voluntary one-way system. In time, signage will be placed at appropriate points as an aid-memoire, but in the meantime could I please urge all parents/carers to try and get into the habit of following this one-way system. I would also like to remind parents/carers that if you need to park to wait for your

child, or to come into school, you should do so in the Village Hall Car Park, so as not to block the roads. Thank you in anticipation of your co-operation.

ONLINE SAFETY

I continue to be extremely concerned about the on-line activities of some of our children. With Christmas approaching and the likelihood that many of our children will be receiving electronic, internet enabled gifts, I have attached the most recent SCOMIS newsletter for parents to the end of this newsletter. Please do take time to read it and take decisive action where necessary. We may like to think that in North Devon our children are safe from predatory behaviour but they are not and we all have a duty to protect them and educate them in how to safely and responsibly use the internet.

PARKING AT LYNTON

Increasingly a number of parents/carers are parking in front of the school at Lynton. This is not necessary and is putting our children's lives in danger. If you bring your child to school by car, please park in Bottom Meadow Car Park and access the school via the rear playground. Permits for parking free-of-charge in the car park at the start and end of the school day are available from Vikki in the office. Please can we all work together to keep our children safe. Thank you.

ARRIVAL TIME AT SCHOOL

It is lovely to see that so many children are arriving at school punctually in the morning – well done. However, a small number of children are arriving at school prior to 8.30am. If your child needs to come to school before this time, could you please book them in at one of our Breakfast Clubs. Other than within Breakfast Club, we cannot supervise children before 8.30am as staff are setting up for the school day. Thank for your consideration and cooperation regarding this matter.

In collective worship we have been thinking about the arrival of Advent. We have been exploring how we can use the period of Advent to think about become courageous advocates, eg, 'being the change that you want to see'. We have talked about making the world a kinder place and how we can help to protect it for generations to come.

Reception, Year 1 & 2 – Streams & Young Buds

It has been another busy two weeks for Steams and Young Buds.

In Maths, the children have been focusing on addition and subtraction. This has also meant looking at the relationship between number fact families such as 10+2=12 and how this is the same as 2+10=12, 12=2+10 and 12=10+2. This can be the same with subtraction.

Please help at home by considering addition and subtraction opportunities and what is this then the 'same as'.

In English, we have continued our focus on verbs. The children have been practically exploring lots of 'doing' words, such as jumping,

skipping, drinking, eating, looking etc. They have also applied this to the book Stickman, when considering what he does in the book. The children are now exploring past tense verbs and the ending 'ed' whilst reading 'The tiger who came to tea' in preparation for writing their own recount.

Preparation is fully underway for the nativities. Please support your child by helping

them to learn their lines and we look forward to welcoming you to the performances. Kentisbury and Lynton children will soon be spending time in the church to practise their nativities. We will be walking there, so please ensure your child comes in to school with a coat and sensible shoes every day as we will decide to go on an ad hoc basis depending on the weather.

We would like to thank those parents/carers who come in and help by listening to the children read. If you would like to do this, then please contact your class teacher.

Year 3 & 4 - Rivers & Oaks

Reading

In English, the children have started their narrative writing sequence, one that we are all enjoying. It is a chance for your children to explore and use their imaginations. Reading a range of books will allow your children to enter on to a variety of different imaginative journeys and greatly benefiting their literacy skills. Just a polite reminder that it is the school's expectation that children should be reading at least 3 times a week outside of school. In Oaks, the more you read at home, the more raffle tickets you receive at school. It is not a requirement that children should read to an adult, they are welcome to read on their own, we just ask for a parent/carer's initial/comment to agree. We ask that the home reading logs come into school daily to allow us to also comment if we have read with them.

Times tables

As some of you may be aware, the government have proposed that by 2019/2020, children in year 4 will be required to sit a statutory timetables test, assessing their recall of timetables up to 12x12. In preparation for this, could we begin/continue to practise the timetables with your children outside of school.

Mathletics

Each week, we may set children a Mathletics tasks. This task needs to be completed before your child/ren can access the full range on the Mathletics site. This is an opportunity for your children to improve and deepen their maths understanding and fluency, whilst earning points and earning certificates. If your children are unable to access this at home, we do offer

time during the school week for such tasks to be completed. We aim to set children tasks that are well suited to the sequence they are currently on in lessons. Over the past couple of weeks, the children in Oaks and Rivers have been exploring addition and subtraction using a range of methods.

Year 5 & 6 - Oceans & Forests

English

Within English this term we have been focussing on a narrative topic. We have been looking at building up our own suspense/adventure stories based on a Pie Corbett text called Kidnapped. The children have been learning the skills of writing a short story, which includes a flashback, whilst using vocabulary for effect.

Maths

Since half term we have been learning about and consolidating our understanding of addition, subtraction and multiplication and in the coming weeks will be moving onto division. It is essential that the children master these skills in order to support their learning across all areas of the curriculum and all areas of maths. It is also vitally important that we continue to build on our times table knowledge and fluency. Any support at given at home with this will be greatly appreciated. The children now also have access to Mathletics which can be completed at home or in school.

Reading

Within guided reading we are continuing to look at the text of Beowulf. The children have been learning to read with expression, intonation and a change of tone. They have been trying to get into the mind-set of the characters whilst reading aloud to their peers. We have also completed some Kennings poems about the characters of Beowulf and Grendel. From the Rectory

Look out for the Great Christmas Treasure Huntcoming to a street near you!

As December begins there are lots of ways of counting down to Christmas. We will be reminded of the number of shopping days left, various magazines include calendars with ideas of what to do each day to make the 25th December a "stress free" celebration and now there are holiday calendars with chocolate for children, and all sort of beauty products, or luxury gifts for grown-ups. All of these have an origin in the Advent calendar which is used as a reminder of what we are actually counting down to.

Advent calendars invite us on a journey to Christmas and often they tell a story of the journeys of all the people involved in the first Christmas. Mary and Joseph took a long time to get from their home in Nazareth to Bethlehem where there was no room for them in the inn, wise men following a star (itself moving light years away!) will have set out perhaps months before they discovered the new King was not in the palace with Herod in Jerusalem and set out again for an unfamiliar suburb. Angels crossed into time from the eternity of heaven to bring the message of the Saviour's birth. Even the shepherds had a bit of walk to find the babe in the manger. All these people set out, not quite knowing what was going to happen next, they set out wondering, hoping and questioning and trusting.

As we celebrate Christmas each year, we know what they found. They arrived at the manger, and discovered that God had come to us as one of us, so that we could get to know and love God as God knows and loves us. God's journey to us and with us, to show us love.

And that is the life long journey that we are invited into, not just every Christmas, but every day of our lives – and like all the nativity characters we don't know always know what is going happen next but we have plenty of our own wondering, hoping, questioning and trusting, but like them we are invited to discover Jesus, God's love in the manger, in our own particular way.

Across Lynton, in the shops and businesses of the town, the journeying nativity characters have been placed so that we can see them in our everyday life, and with each of them will be a letter. Can you find all the letters and spell out the Christmas message they have to share with us? Come and find the message and its treasure at the URC Carol Service on 23rd December and the Crib Service at St Mary's at 4pm at on Christmas Eve. God Bless!
