KENTISBURY READING FOR PLEASURE AWARD - CLAIRE BARKER



Hot on the heels of Book Week, I am absolutely thrilled to share the exciting news that Kentisbury has received a 'Reading for Pleasure' Award from the Society of Authors. As you may remember, Kentisbury was visited last term by children's author, Claire Barker, as part of the Appledore Book Festival. Claire nominated Kentisbury for this award to honour our inspiring efforts to promote reading for pleasure. In support of our nomination, Claire cited: 'A remote Exmoor Primary School without even a mobile phone signal, this small rural school's numbers are ever rising. This popularity is a testament to a passionate team of teachers, who work their socks off to ensure that their children are immersed in a rich reading culture from the first days of their school life. This is a school that genuinely appreciates the value of story, its walls covered in advanced creative work which proudly illustrates the children's progress. Books were everywhere, stitched into the very fabric of their school day. Here they know that books make children happier and wiser and everyone I met, from the administrators to the Head, was fully on board. In this age of persistent distraction, the children's questions, their patience, their engagement and enthusiasm was inspirational and a testament to what a true culture of

Reading for Pleasure can achieve.' As you can imagine, we feel extremely privileged to have received such a prestigious award and, had Claire visited Parracombe and Lynton too, I have no doubt that she would have seen and felt exactly the same way – reading is something that we value highly across the federation and of which we are very proud, especially when this is recognised at such a high level by an author who spends much time visiting schools up and down the country and who, in the space of just a morning, can see and appreciate our passion for promoting reading. Thank you Claire for nominating us, we feel extremely honoured and well done to all of our children, staff and parents across the federation for ensuring that reading has such a high profile.

However, could I please ask that you time these communications considerately and enable staff to enjoy a little 'down time' over the weekend and during school holidays – messages sent in the early hours to a devise which is also used as an alarm can be quite intrusive and disruptive to sleep. Also, please bear in mind that messages sent out-of-hours may not be responded to until the start of the next working day. Thank you in anticipation of your co-operation regarding this matter.

VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS

Over recent months we have noticed a significant reduction in the number of parents/carers making voluntary donations towards visits and events such as Science Week. As you have no doubt heard in the media, school budgets are becoming ever tighter as Government funding reduces greatly in real terms. As a federation we have, to a certain extent, been protected from this because of our capacity to share staffing and resources. This enables us to provide our children with significantly more opportunities than many other schools and, although it might not always feel like it, our requests for

voluntary contributions are very low compared to many other schools, some of which are even asking parents to provide their children with pens, pencils and toilet roll!! However, in order to continue offering our children a wide range of school experiences, we do need the majority of parents to make voluntary contributions, otherwise these activities will become financially unviable. Thank you for helping us to give your children experiences that they will hopefully remember for a lifetime.

BUG BUSTING HEADLICE

There have been a number of reported cases of head lice across the federation again recently. Head lice are tiny insects that live in hair. Nits are the empty egg cases attached to hair that head lice hatch from. Head lice are a common problem, particularly in school children aged 4-11. They are largely harmless, but can live in the hair for a long time if not treated and can be irritating and frustrating to deal with. Head lice can be difficult to spot, even when the head is closely inspected. They are very small, whitish or grey-brown insects that range from the size of a pinhead to the size of a sesame seed. The only way to be sure someone has head lice is to find a live louse by combing their hair with a special fine-toothed comb. This is called detection combing. Regular detection combing, once a week, is the best way to prevent head lice. Detection combing can be carried out on wet or dry hair, although wet combing with conditioner run through the hair is more effective as it stops the head lice from moving. If you detect head lice in your child's hair they can be treated with lotions or sprays or with an intensive programme of wet combing. We would really like to become a head lice free school but this is only possible if EVERY parent uses a detection comb on a weekly basis and treats accordingly. With your cooperation we can hopefully eradicate these rather irritating creatures from school and help all of our children feel more comfortable. Please do help us in our Bug Busting endeavours.

THREADWORMS

We also wanted to let you know there have been new cases of threadworm reported across the Federation. Threadworms can go unnoticed; we would ask that you please keep an eye to your child/ren. The symptoms are intense itching around the bottom, particularly at night. Threadworms can be easily treated with medication from your GP or Pharmacist and children may return to School once treated. It is important to maintain good hygiene and ensure children wash their hands regularly, especially after going to the toilet and at mealtimes.

Community

From the Rectory

There is a very beautiful Easter hymn which has its origin in Jesus' words at the beginning of Holy Week: "unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains a single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit."

As April progresses, the days lengthen and the sun warms we will be seeing the fruitfulness of the natural world around us. The trees in leaf and blossom, the late green blades from bulbs and the emergence of shoots and seedlings for the vegetable garden, all confirm the abundant power of life at work in the natural world. Each spring is a time of renewal and hope in the power of life around us after the dark and deadened days of winter. But those deadened days of winter, the time of buried seeds, give way to the abundance of spring and the summer to come.

In our own lives each of us experience changing seasons – times of great joy, exhilaration, and fruitfulness, but also times of pain, anxiety and loss.

As this April progresses, the Church is travelling through the end of Lent towards the celebration of Easter. We will mark the final week of Jesus' life with Maundy Thursday when Jesus drew his friends into a new community marked by a shared meal to experience his presence with them and a call to love one another and serve all around them, Good Friday when he carried all that destroys human love and life for us to death on the cross, Holy Saturday when he laid in the earth of a tomb, and then Easter Day when, raised to life, he appeared to his friends to show them that God's love and life is stronger than death, and to share with them that eternal life and love forever.

Our journey with Jesus shows us that the message of our faith is not just for good times, not a shallow offer of temporary joy, but Jesus travels with us through the worst of experiences to bring us the hope that, as surely as spring follows winter, his love will bring us to life and joy once more.

Now the green blade riseth from the buried grain, Wheat that in dark earth many days has lain; Love lives again, that with the dead has been: Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green.

In the grave they laid him, love whom men had slain,
Thinking that never he would wake again.
Laid in the earth like grain that sleeps unseen:
Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green,

Forth he came at Easter, like the risen grain, He that for three days in the grave had lain. Quick from the dead my risen Lord is seen: Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green.

When our hearts are wintry, grieving, or in pain, Thy touch can call us back to life again; Fields of our hearts that dead and bare have been: Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green.
