#### Dear Parents/Carers

As the Spring Term draws to a close, I would like to thank each and every one of you for your continued support. Despite the on-going impact of covid, I have been incredibly proud of our children this term; their resilience and stamina for learning continues to grow and it has been wonderful to spend time in each class talking to our children about their learning and seeing their genuine passion for all aspects of the curriculum. We have been visited a couple of times this term by our Education Advisor from the Local Authority and they too have been very impressed by the learning that our children have been undertaking. This year, we have gone about teaching the curriculum in a slightly different way, with subjects such as science, DT, history and geography being blocked. Rather than our children having a short lesson of each during the course of a week, they are now focusing just on one subject for a sustained period of time. This has really enabled our children to efficiently explore an aspect of the curriculum in depth, and feedback from our children is that they definitely prefer this approach.

#### EASTER SERVICES

Thank you so much to everyone who was able to join our children as they celebrated Easter at Christ Church and St Mary's yesterday. How lovely it was to see all of our children enjoying the occasion and participating so whole-heartedly through a wonderful array of song, poetry, drama and prayer. It was lovely to come together and enjoy a real sense of 'normal' as the spring term draws to a close.

#### PINKERY RESIDENTIAL - YEAR 3&4

What a genuine pleasure it was to join both our Lynton and Parracombe/Kentisbury Year 3 & 4 children on their residential trips to the Pinkery Centre earlier this term. It was a fabulous week and so lovely to see our children really flourish as they were pushed out of their comfort zones. For many, it was the first time away from home, other than perhaps staying with a relative, and each and every one of our children coped with this admirably. I have been leading residentials for many years now, but I never fail to be amazed by how the children change in such a short period of time and how their independence soars. Often it is the little big things that make the difference - choosing what combination of clothes to put on, making their own lunch and choosing the most ridiculous combination of sandwich fillings, sharing a room with their friends, going to sleep without the reassurance of a goodnight kiss from those at home but surrounded by love and support from their peers, trying out new activities, re-packing their bag at the end of their stay ... The list is endless, with each challenge or experience helping our children to grow socially and emotionally and become just that little bit more self assured and independent.

The Pinkery Centre is always a wonderful place to take the children, especially when we are able to walk in from Shallowford. It gives a real sense of how remote and isolated parts of Exmoor are and is the perfect start to a big adventure, especially with the added bonus of a picnic lunch at Pinkery Pond and a trip through the infamous Pinkery tunnel! Lynton enjoyed the most glorious weather as we walked in on Monday - the views from Woodbarrow were just

stunning. Parracombe and Kentisbury enjoyed a more familiar day on Wednesday with mist and drizzle, but with the added delight of a close encounter with a herd of Exmoor ponies. Once at the centre, each and every one of our children engaged with great enthusiasm and determination as they tried their hand at archery, low-ropes, problem solving, stream-dipping and grass sledging. I was extremely proud to see our CARIS values being exemplified by all of our children throughout the week; their curiosity to seek out new experiences; their ability to persevere and achieve things that they initially thought were beyond them; the respect that they showed to those around them and their environment; the inspiration that they gained from their surroundings, as well as inspiring and being inspired by their peers; and, most importantly, the incredible support that they gave to one another during their time away. The team at the Pinkery Centre were extremely complimentary about all of our children, noting how polite and well mannered they were at all times - they were a true credit to themselves and the federation. Thank you Year 3 & 4 - I hope that you enjoyed your time away as much as I did. Thank you also to Mr Huggins, Mrs Bowden-Berry, Mrs Gubb-Fradgely, Ms Strachan and Mrs Kelly for accompanying the children and making the trip possible.










#### HAND WASHING & CONTINUED COVID MEASURES

As we enter the third year of the pandemic, it is reassuring to feel a sense of normality returning, albeit that covid has far from disappeared. Reported cases of covid continue to rise within the locality and the impact of covid related absence, both for children and staff, is still being deeply felt across the federation. With this in mind, could I please remind everyone of the importance of regular hand washing and sanitising (especially when entering any of our school buildings) - good hand and respiratory hygiene will help to minimise the spread of a multitude of 'nasties', including covid. It is also important that we all remain vigilant with regards to potential covid symptoms. If your child has symptoms of a respiratory infection and a high temperature, or if they feel unwell, they should stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature. In the event of a positive COVID-19 test result, children and staff will be asked to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, the period during which they are most infectious.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

Thank you so much to those parents/carers who have worked so hard to ensure that their children's attendance has remained good despite the challenges presented by covid and the plethora of other 'nasties' doing the rounds. The national average for primary school attendance currently stands at 92.5%. Our Kentisbury registered children are in line with this, whereas our Lynton children have a combined attendance of 95.39% and our Parracombe children have a combined rate of 96.53% - well done! The government target is for each child to have an attendance rate of 96% or above to ensure that they have the very best educational life chances. Thank you for working with us to try and achieve this - every day at school (or every day missed) really does make a difference.



#### **COLLECTIVE WORSHIP**

This half term we have been thinking about our CARIS value of Respect. Our children have been thinking about what respect means to them and how they can show respect, not only to others, but also to themselves and the world within

which we live. We have been thinking about how different world religions show respect for their faith and discussing how Jesus demonstrated respect by washing the feet of his disciples. We have also been sensitively considering the war in Ukraine, with our Associate Governors across the federation being courageous advocates and organising Bake Sales to raise funds for both the Red Cross Ukraine Appeal and the ShelterBox - Emergency in Ukraine Appeal.

Finally, I would like to wish you all an enjoyable and restful Easter break. I very much look forward to welcoming your children back to school on Monday 25th April.

#### Raindrops, Streams & Saplings

It's hard to believe that Easter is nearly upon us. The time seems to be flying by and it has been wonderful to see how much we have managed to squeeze into this term.

Our thematic learning is being carefully planned to allow the children to make links through all of their learning. This term this has meant that the children have been studying plants as part of their science topic, whilst focussing on Jack and the Beanstalk in English. The children built on their previous learning of narrative, and created their very own version of Jack and the Beanstalk, whilst becoming increasingly familiar with this as another example of a Fairy tale. The children have been fully immersed in the exploration of plants, creating their own science experiment by planting and growing seeds in bags and exploring what conditions they grow in best. They have also enjoyed revisiting their previous learning on line drawing, colour and collage, when creating their own art based on beautiful Daffodils.

Year 1 at Kentisbury have enjoyed their turn at Forest School and continued this wonderful learning outside, as they have worked with Mrs Watts, developing the garden patch at Kentisbury. They even enjoyed a visit to Arlington Court, in the sunshine, where they put their learning into practice by spotting examples of common plants and trees. Raindrops have also thoroughly enjoyed observing their very own caterpillars and their life cycles.

This week, it has been wonderful seeing various 'normal' events begin to resurface; Easter services, Easter egg hunts and Bake sales. We are continuously in awe of the children and their resilience to the ongoing situations.

#### HOLIDAY ACTIVITY AND FOOD (HAF) PROGRAMME

If your child is eligible for benefits related free school meals, they can access a range of HAF activities during the Easter holiday, all of which are free of charge and include the provision of a healthy, hot meal. Other children may also be eligible, although priority is given to those in receipt of FSM (and their friends, if this will encourage them to attend). Other eligible children include:

• children assessed by the local authority as being in need, at risk or vulnerable (for example, children on a Child Protection Plan, Children in Need or on an Early Help plan);



- young carers
- looked-after children or previously looked after children;
- children with an EHC (education, health and care) plan;
- children who have low attendance rates at school or who are at risk of exclusion;
- children living in areas of high deprivation or from low-income households who are not in receipt of free school meals.
